Title-chasing Philippines XI go for Game 2 win in Thailand

Match on Monday

(Rajamangala Stadium, Bangkok)
8 p.m. (9 p.m. Manila time) — Thailand vs Philippines (Semifinal Leg 2)

AFTER breaking a 52-year winless streak against Thailand, is a breakthrough finals stint in Southeast Asia's centerpiece football tournament up next for fearless Philippines?

That's certainly the agenda as the Filipinos go for the kill shot and try to complete the upset for the ages against seven-time winners Thailand in Leg 2 of the Asean Mitsubishi Electric Cup semifinals on Monday.

But unlike in their monumental 2-1 upset in Friday's opening leg in front of friendly faces in Manila, the Pinoy booters will have to get it done in hostile territory in Bangkok, where the wounded three-peat-seeking War Elephants and their 50,000-plus rabid supporters lie in wait at Rajamangala Stadium.

"We need to be mentally tough throughout the whole 90 minutes," said Philippine team manager Freddy Gonzalez ahead of their gargantuan task at 9 p.m. (Manila time).

Thanks to the famous result in Leg 1, the Filipinos go into the return leg with a one-goal edge.

And all they need is a draw in the Thai capital to win the two-legged semis on goal aggregate and advance to the Jan. 2 and 5 Last Dance against either Vietnam or Singapore.

Another victory, of course, will be good for the soul moving to the upgraded objective of a milestone championship.

A loss by one goal will lead to a 30-minute extra time and potentially a penalty shootout to determine the winner of this Final Four matchup. But a loss by two goals or more will be catastrophic.

"I never go for a draw," said coach Albert Capellas. "We go

for a win and then let's see if we can win, if we can draw, or whatever result happens. I never play for a draw. Philippines, we are winners."

The prospect of playing a historic home game in the finale gives the Filipinos added motivation to bring this to the finish line.

"The job is not even halfway done," Sandro Reyes said after the Philippines eked out its first victory over Thailand since 1972. "We have a really difficult second leg coming up and we want to play a final in Manila, so we'll give everything to play that final game." — **Olin Leyba**

Eala eyes qualification for a grand slam main draw

A GRAND SLAM main draw qualification for the first time, another pro and title and an entry to the Top 100.

Alex Eala has locked her eyes on those goals for 2025 after a year marked by triumphs and heartbreaks, near hits and misses this season.

"No. 1 is to qualify for a grand slam main draw. That's the first goal," said Ms. Eala on the *Power and Play* radio program of his uncle Noli Eala over the weekend.

The 19-year-old Filipina sensation this year made it to the qualifying finals in the French Open, Wimbledon and US Open with hopes of being the first Filipina player ever in a Grand Slam main tournament.

But Ms. Eala succumbed to more seasoned and higher-ranked opponents to miss out on the golden opportunity.

Ms. Eala bowed to Julia Riera of Argentina, 6-4, 6(3)-7, 4-6, in the French Open finals, to New Zealand's Lulu Sun, 6(3)-7, 5-7, in the Wimbledon finale and to Romania's Elena-Gabriela Ruse in the US Open qualifying championship.

"I do think that I passed a lot of milestones this year but there are definitely moments where I thought I was so close to achieving more but it just didn't happen. It's okay, at the end I'm very happy with how I performed and improved this year," she added.

As for her two other inspirations, it's only a matter of when next year owing to a steady rise in the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) and consistent showing in world tours.

"Ranking-wise, I'd like to get close to Top 100 and third, I'd like to win a title," she beamed.

Ms. Eala is currently No. 148 in the WTA rankings, after starting from outside the Top 1000 in her 2020 debut, with five singles and three doubles titles to show.

She won her latest singles title in the W100 Vitoria-Gasteiz in Spain, where she also ruled the doubles division with partner Estelle Cascino from France.

That's the first of three doubles crowns she all won this season after also reigning supreme in the W75 Croissy-Beaubourg in France with Cascino and the W50 Pune in India with Latvia's Darja Semenistaja.

More than 120 killed after South Korean airliner crashes

MUAN COUNTY, South Korea — At least 124 people were killed when an airliner belly-landed and veered off the runway, erupting in a fireball as it slammed into a wall at South Korea's Muan International Airport on Sunday, the national fire agency said.

Jeju Air flight 7C2216, arriving from the Thai capital Bangkok with 181 people on board, was attempting to land shortly after 9 a.m. (0000 GMT) at the airport in the south of the country, South Korea's transport ministry said.

It is the worst air accident involving a South Korean airline in nearly three decades and on track to become the country's deadliest ever, according to ministry data.

The twin-engine Boeing 737-800 can be seen in video from local media skidding down the runway with no apparent landing gear before slamming into a wall in an explosion of flame and debris. Other photos showed smoke and fire engulfing parts of the plane.

Two crew members, a man and a woman, were rescued from the tail section of the burning plane, Muan fire chief Lee Jung-hyun told a briefing. The fire was extinguished as of 1 p.m., Mr. Lee said.

"Only the tail part retains a little bit of shape, and the rest of (the plane) looks almost impossible to recognize," he said.

Authorities had switched from rescue to recovery operations and because of the force of the impact, are searching nearby areas for bodies possibly thrown from the plane, Mr. Lee added.

The two crew were being treated at hospitals with medium to severe injuries, said the head of the local public health center.

Hours after the crash, mortuary vehicles were lined up to take bodies away, and authorities said a temporary morgue had been established.

The crash site smelled of aviation fuel and blood, according to Reuters witnesses, and workers in protective suits and masks combed the area while soldiers searched through bushes.

Yonhap news agency cited a fire official as saying most of the 175 passengers and six crew were presumed dead.

Authorities had worked to rescue people in the tail section, an airport official told Reuters shortly after the crash.

The crash is the worst by any South Korean airline since a 1997 Korean Air crash in Guam that killed more than 200 people, according to transportation ministry data.

Investigators are looking into bird strikes and weather conditions as possible factors, Mr. Lee said. Yonhap cited airport authorities as saying a bird strike may have caused the landing gear to malfunction.

A passenger texted a relative to say a bird was stuck in the wing, the News1 agency reported. The person's final message was, "Should I say my last words?"

The passengers included two Thai nationals and the rest are believed to be South Koreans, according to the transportation ministry.

The Boeing 737-800 jet, operated by Jeju Air, was manufactured in 2009, the transport ministry said.

Jeju Air Chief Executive Officer Kim E-bae apologized for the accident, bowing deeply during a televised briefing.

He said the cause of the crash was still unknown, that the aircraft had no record of accidents and there were no early signs of malfunction. The airline will cooperate with investigators and make supporting the bereaved its top priority, Mr. Kim said.

No abnormal conditions were reported when the aircraft left Bangkok's Suvarnabhumi Airport, said Kerati Kijmanawat, president of Airports of Thailand.

Founded in 2005, Jeju Air is a low-cost airline that operates international routes to Japan, Thailand, and the Philippines, in addition to numerous domestic flights.

Boeing said in an e-mailed statement, "We are in contact with Jeju Air regarding flight 2216 and stand ready to support them. We extend our deepest condolences to the families who lost loved ones, and our thoughts remain with the passengers and crew."

The US Federal Aviation Administration did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

All domestic and international flights at Muan airport had been canceled, Yonhap reported.

South Korean acting President Choi Sang-mok, named interim leader of the country on Friday in an ongoing political crisis, arrived at the scene of the accident and said the government was putting all its resources into dealing with the crash.

Two Thai women were on the plane, aged 22 and 45, Thai government spokesperson Jirayu Houngsub said, adding that details were still being verified.

Thai Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra sent condolences to the families of the dead and injured in a post on X, saying she had instructed the foreign ministry to provide assistance.

The ministry said in a statement it was in touch with the South Korean authorities. — **Reuters**

North Korea launches 'toughest' US strategy

SEOUL — North Korean leader Kim Jong Un held a key policy-setting meeting of the country's ruling party last week ahead of the new year, state media KCNA reported on Sunday.

The meeting of party and government officials decided that North Korea would launch the "toughest" strategy to counteract the United States for its security and national interests, the report said, without elaborating.

The alliance between South Korea, the US and Japan has expanded to a "nuclear military bloc" and South Korea has become an "anti-communist outpost" for the US, the KCNA report added.

Trump sides with billionaire Musk in debate over H-1B visas

WEST PALM BEACH, Florida - President-elect Donald J. Trump on Saturday

sided with key supporter and billionaire tech Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Elon Musk in a public dispute over the use of the H-1B visa, saying he fully backs the program for foreign tech workers opposed by some of his supporters.

Mr. Trump's remarks followed a series of social media posts from Mr. Musk, the CEO of Tesla and SpaceX, who vowed late Friday to go to "war" to defend the visa program for foreign tech workers.

Mr. Trump, who moved to limit the visas' use during his first presidency,
